Work in Progress:

Book tentatively entitled: *Knowing Her Place*, a multiracial, multiethnic history of sexuality, gender, and the law in nineteenth century California. In this study, I am focusing on working class women’s sex work, moral panics regulating sexuality and vice, age of consent law, breach of marriage promise and seduction cases, habeas corpus cases involving women’s claims to children, and women and children’s court testimonies and debates over their legal competence. I hope to expand a recently submitted forum article on California Spanish-Mexican and

Indigenous women's counternarratives about Manifest Destiny and imperialism into a journal-length article addressing not only California women, but Spanish-speaking and Indigenous women elsewhere in the U.S. Southwest.
